Run Reports <u>Ouray, Colorado</u>

10 total rigs, 6 members.

2 cowbells awarded 1) Mike Morey and 2) Michael Monroe

Here is a quick rundown of our trip as we just completed our last day on the trail:

Several of use actually did a couple days in Moab and 1 extra day in Ouray before the rest of the members showed up, but since we only had 2 members for these days, these were not 'official' runs.

We were in Moab the night of the flash flood, and luckily missed it by about 30 mins downtown. We were on Fins n Things when the storm started, and quickly exited the mountain.

Consistently we had risk of rain and thunderstorms, so we adjusted the trail schedule as needed. Weather overall cooperated. We also had lots of trail traffic due to a motorcycle event all week on the trails, so lots of trail traffic.

Everywhere we crested 11500+ foot peaks (highest was 13k) and lots of waterfalls, scenery, old historic/abandoned mining buildings everywhere. Too much to list.

8/22 – Ophir Pass and Last Dollar Road

9 total rigs, 5 members. We started the day at the Ophir Pass trailhead at 9am, and proceeded up the trail without issue before arriving at the peak about 2 hours later. After some photos, we headed down into Telluride for lunch. Afterwards we returned to Ophir via Last Dollar road, a scenic but easy dirt road.

8/23 – Alpine Loop (Engineer Pass/Cinnamon Pass/California Gulch/Corkscrew Pass)

This was our longest day on the trail, covering 60 miles of dirt. We started at 7:00 am and proceeded up the Mineral Creek trailhead towards Engineer pass. The trail was wet and lots of mud puddles, with several stream crossings. Took us about 3 hours to arrive at the Engineer peak, where we stopped for some photos. We then proceeded to Cinnamon Pass and we had lunch along the creek on the trail. Proceeding down towards Animas Forks where we stopped to walk the historic district. We then proceeded up California Gulch and then Corkscrew Pass which consisted of multiple sharp switchbacks before exiting the trail about 6:00 pm.

8/24 – Black Bear Pass, Imogene Pass

9 total Rigs, 5 members. Steve Cave - leader. The group met at 9am and headed to the Blackbear trailhead. The group made the long incline up and over the pass, taking time for photos at the summit before heading down to the 'steps' obstacle with the group passed with little effort and some spotting. We then proceeded down the switchbacks, which was overall uneventful although very scenic. Lots of careful spotting around the tight switchbacks got everyone though safely. We completed the trail and had lunch in Telluride before heading on to Imogene. Fairly early in the trip we observed a motorcycle rider who had ridden off the trail accidently and needed assistance, so the group used a winch and lots of muscle to get him back on the trail. We headed up Imogene and took photos at the summit before heading down the trail. Trail was wet with lots of mud, and we ended the day about 5:30pm.

8/25 – Poughkeepsie Gulch

8 total rigs, 5 members. Nick Kovacevich – Leader. We met and departed at 8:00 and drove to the trailhead (Mineral Creek). Trail was wet and lots of water puddles/holes, and a handful of river crossings 6-18" deep. We arrived at 'the Wall'. Robert G took the first crack at the obstacle, which is about 12' tall rockface. I was able to get up on the first attempt with lockers. 4 other rigs also were able to make it up the obstacle, all but 1 had lockers. 2 member rigs had to be winched (Mike Morey – JT – no lockers/long wheelbase) and Mike Monroe (Chevy Colorado on 31s, no ground clearance / limited articulation). We returned back via Mineral Creek and ended the day at 12:30pm.

Only minor mechanical issues were experienced (battery connection to starter, low idle issue) which were both resolved.

Gold Mountain/John Bull July 2022

I led a group of 13 rigs on Gold Mountain/John Bull yesterday.

The group met at 9 and departed at 9:30 at Gold mountain. We had 5 member rigs and 8 guests. Craig and Mark ended up sharing tail gunner duties.

Just before departure, it was discovered one member rig had a leaking valve stem. We used a Colby stem to replace the damaged unit. No further issues.

On the incline up Gold Mountain, one guest rig developed an overheating issue. They elected to turn around and head back down the mountain.

The group moved quickly through the Gold Mountain obstacles. Some difficulty was had on both the first and third obstacle, requiring additional spotting.

Whole traversing the 3rd obstacle (large rock/v cut) one member rig became stuck then developed a vapor lock. The vehicle eventually started after cooling off, and took the easier route around the obstacle. Another member got a door ding when his rig contacted a tree.

The group stopped for lunch about 12:00 near the top of the mountain. After a quick lunch, the group resumed travels down the hill. We were off the trail about 1:30.

Several attendees decided not to go on to John Bull, and headed home. The rest took the drive over to John Bull.

The group inadvertently ran John Bull backwards - which was a different experience for all of us. Lack of paying attention by trail leader! We decided to go with it.

Running this one backwards is a pretty unique experience, especially the last downhill towards the normal gatekeeper. Some pretty big drops going downhill really test the nerves.

Everyone made it through the gatekeeper relatively smoothly, except for Craig whom required some extra rock stacking and wheel speed to avoid a cowbell, but made it through without the winch or a strap.

The group aired up and departed for home at 3:30pm

No cowbells to report.

Two large rocks needed repositioning at the gatekeeper, using Ray's winch and Greg's winch, with Ron supplying the chocker chain. We continued running the trail hanging marker flags at each turn without finding any major debris along the way. Ray and Karen moved ahead to create a strategic position for good radio communications as the group would move forward.

HDR Run - May 28 & Sunday, 29, 2022

Friday evening Ron and Emi hosted dinner at the Dirt Devils camp serving hamburgers and the fixing with Russian margaritas. A nice group showed up to enjoy Ron and Emi's hospitality.

On Saturday we had 31 vehicles in line for the run at 8:00am. With the trail crew in their position at each obstacle there were no issues or delays. We reached the lunch area earlier than planned at about 10:30am. During lunch the Desert Burros guests elected to separate from the Devils Loop group and went off on their own. We finished the run back at Slash X at 1:30pm. Dave and Trish served an afternoon snack soon thereafter to the Dirt Devils members.

On Sunday we again had 31 vehicles in line with a start-off at 9:00am, running the trail in the opposite direction of Saturday's run. Trail crew again moved themselves into position. All vehicles made it through the gatekeeper, but at the first obstacle a Toyota high centered and blew a tire bead from its wheel. During the recovery, the Blue Moon Run group (an easier trail run) was passing by and the Toyota occupants elected to join them. The next issue was a four-door Rubicon high centering on his cross member. Dave and Rob used their winches to break the Rubicon loose. We made it to the lunch area about 1:00pm and finished the run about 3:30pm.

Thanks to the Dirt Devils trail crew consisting of: Ray, Karen, Dave and Trish, Ron, Randy, Castillo and wife, Rick, Gary, Bill, and Rob. They made this event run very smoothly for our guests.

The club now has it own license

HAM update/report.

the FCC has issued the Dirt Devils a club license (Thank you Jay) Jay applied for and got a vanity call sign. Our club call sign is KK1DD. In order to use the club call sign on runs, we will need to have a ham control operator (someone with a HAM radio call sign) on every run.

the club having its own license gives us the option of having non-licensed people on our runs being able to use their ham radios with the club call sign as long as they are on a run with a licensed operator.

We strongly encourage everyone get their own license. Please See Mike Wallace for help Programming your HAM Radios.

Jay Van Wormer went over the club license for the new members/guests.

If you are interesting getting your HAM license, the HAM radio testing pool questions are on the club website. There are 100 questions in the pool and they pull 35 questions for the test, you can get 9 wrong and still pass. If you study, you can pass the test. Jay encourages members to get licensed.

Live classes are starting to come up again, testing and radio information on the HAM & CB Radio tab on the club website.

The FCC is looking to mandate a \$50 fee for licenses (currently free) so if you want to get your license, now is the time to do it.

There are lots of advantages of HAM over CB, you have more distance for communication, better quality.

Handheld radios are fine for the club but are not as efficient as the mounted radio with an exterior antenna.

The cow bell rules are: Cow bells are awarded from air down to air up. If you get stuck and are unable to move under your own power and need the help of a winch or you get strapped from one of your fellow Dirt Devils then you have earned the privilege of hanging the cow bell from your front bumper. You must leave the cow bell on the front of your rig until another Dirt Devil gets stuck. Then you help attach the cow bell to their bumper.
